














Fundraising at Oratory

A reminder of the message that was sent out on Classlist this week:

Dear Parents.

I thought it would be helpful to clarify the different and crucial fundraising channels that we have as a school. Therefore, please read the important message from Fr Michael, our Chair of Governors, below and the attached document

Message from Fr Michael:

The Oratory Primary Schools is a voluntary aided school, and this means that the Government contributes only 90% of our capital costs. The remaining 10% of our capital costs need to be covered by the school's foundation (the Fathers of the Oratory). Funding from the Diocese of Westminster is limited, because we are not a diocesan school. The Building Maintenance Fund (Governors' Fund) was set up to finance capital projects, above all the maintenance of the building. There is always something that needs to be repaired or renewed, and I am sure you are all aware how expensive such work can be these days, even fixing a seemingly small issue. On behalf of the Governing Body, I would like to ask you for your support. If you can, please make a voluntary contribution of £100 per child and per year to our Governors' Fund. This will help us to maintain the school building in good shape. May God bless your generosity!

THE NEWMAN FUND

The **Newman Fund** is a voluntary school charity that allows parents and supporters to make regular donations (monthly or one-off) to support essential school expenses not fully covered by government funding.

- The school is small, but many of its costs (admin, internet, premises) are similar to larger schools.
- Government funding is based on pupil numbers and is increasingly tight, leading to staff reductions and cuts in curriculum resources.
- The fund helps maintain educational quality during financial constraints.

What Does the Newman Fund Support?

- Renting St Luke's playground

What's been going on in class this week?

Year 6

Another busy and productive week in Year 6, which started with a fantastic Eco workshop that the children thoroughly enjoyed. We are looking forward to our Poetry Fortnight next week for which our focus will be World War One poetry.

English: Drafting our trickster story openings, focusing on character description and atmosphere; continuing and finishing our stories; proof-reading and editing them ready for publication.

Maths: Square numbers and cube numbers; reviewing methods of multiplication, long multiplication and solving problems with multiplication.

Science: drawing, building and testing circuits following scientific diagrams

RE: Reflecting on the wonder of God's Creation; reading Bible verses linked to Creation and writing our own creation poems

Latin: To understand that adjectives agree with nouns in number and gender

History: To understand how WW1 created a new type of warfare and how trenches impacted the life of soldiers

Art: To understand the purpose of installation art and plan design for clay poppies







Year 5

Year 5 have had a fantastic week celebrating both Autumn Week and Eco Week! We started off with an exciting Eco workshop, which really got us thinking about how we can care for our environment, and we ended the week in style with our Autumn Mufti Day. Here's a glimpse of what we've been learning:

In Maths, we have been working on subtracting whole numbers with more than four digits, as well as using mental strategies for addition and subtraction. We've also practised rounding to estimate and check our answers — using both our accuracy and confidence.

In English, we concluded our class novel, *Tales from The Caribbean*, by choosing our favourite tale and turning it into a comic strip. We explored different shot types and comic features to bring our stories to life.

In PSHE, we continued exploring the theme of celebrating diversity. We wrote thoughtful acrostic poems and reflected on the importance of embracing what makes us unique.

In RE, we have been reflecting on how God calls us to care for creation, thinking about how we can use our Godgiven gifts to help others. We also looked at the example of St. Francis of Assisi, considering how we can follow in his footsteps.

In Art, we began our exciting project on Egyptian tomb paintings by selecting and transferring part of an image to start building our own artwork.

In Science, we explored the process of reproduction in plants, carefully drawing and labelling each stage of the cycle.

Year 4:

Year 4 have had another wonderful week. We really enjoyed our Eco workshop on Monday and learned all about re-using and repurposing materials. We even got to make our own fish!

English: In English we have been writing our own narratives of twisted tales.

Maths: We practised addition of 4-digit numbers with exchanges.

R.E: We reflected on God's call to Moses and learned how God chose David to be king.

P.S.H.E: We discussed age restrictions and how this helps to keep us safe on the internet.

History: We learned about the structure of the Roman army and the differences between legionaries and auxiliaries.

P.E: We practised our skills and developed our teamwork through exciting handball games.

Art: We completed our Roman mosaics.

Science: We discussed the importance of evaporation and condensation as part of the water cycle.

French: We learned how to describe illnesses of different body parts in French.

Year 3:

Year 3 have had a wonderful week, starting off with a great Eco Week workshop. This week Year 3 have learnt:

- -In Maths, we have begun our topic of addition and subtraction. We have focused on our number bonds within 10 to support us with adding and subtracting 1s and 10s from 3-digit numbers.
- -In English, we have focused on using our reading skills of summarising to create a blurb for The Pied Piper of Hamelin. We then used paragraphs and fronted adverbials in a retelling of the story.
- -In RE, we looked at our own Godparents and thought about the importance of promises and the Baptismal Promises our parents and godparents have made for us.
- -In PSHE, we thought about our emotional wellbeing and the actions we take when our feelings are heightened.
- -In French, we used our knowledge of numbers to answer the question 'How old are you?'.
- -In PE, we created a full-length pitch handball game. We focused on our sportsmanship.
- -In Science, we looked at animal skeletons. We organised animals into vertebrates and invertebrates.
- -In Art, we finished our work on our pop-up cities inspired by Barbara Gilhooley's work.







Year 2:

Year 2 have had a lovely Autumn Eco week! The children had a lovely time at Holland Park Ecology Centre where they went minibeast hunting. They also enjoyed their Eco workshop during which they learnt about different habitats and made a bug hotel for our rooftop garden. Here is what else they have been up to:

- In **Maths**, we have started our unit on 'Addition and Subtraction'. We focused on number bonds to 10 and 20 and worked to understand fact families and related facts.
- In **English**, we finished our text 'Rapunzel'. We did some debating and discussed whether Rapunzel should or should not try to escape from the tower. We then retold the story of Rapunzel using the past tense.
- In **RE**, we learnt about Daniel in the Lion's Den. We discussed how we can learn from Daniel's complete trust in God and how his faith saved him.
- In **Science**, we continued our focus on minibeasts and microhabitats with a visit to Holland Park Ecology Centre.









Year 1:

We were so proud of the children's behaviour on the school trip to Holland Park. They represented our school beautifully. This is what we have been learning this week:

English: This week we have been exploring sentence structures and focusing on our capital letters and full stops. We have been learning the order of the alphabet and reordering letter.

Maths: This week in Maths, we have been ordering numbers and pictures. We have also been using number lines to find the missing numbers. We have also been using our greater than, less than and equals to symbols to compare numbers.

Science: We have been exploring the sense of hearing. The children listened to different sounds in the environment and we sorted them into loud and quiet sounds.

Phonics: In Phonics this week we have been learning the sounds y (making the ie sound), igh and ea. We have been learning the tricky words little, down, live, give.

Religious Education: In RE we have been learning the story of Noah and the Ark. We have been learning about God's promise to us and thinking about our promises to look after the planet.

Art: In Art we have been making drawings of rainforest leaves using pastels and jungle animals after being introduced to Rousseau's 'Surprised!' painting.

Geography: In Geography we have been understanding that weather patterns are different around the world. We have been comparing Greenland, the UK and South Africa.

Reception:

Reception have had a wonderful week of learning and have enjoyed exploring their learning in different ways.

Phonics: This week, we focused on the single sounds d,q,o,u.

Literacy: This week, we continued our class text Dogger. The children have been discussing and writing about their favourite toy.

Maths: This week, we have been learning about colour and shape patterns.

UTW: This week, we talked about the differences in toys from the past and toys in the present. We talked about what they were made of and how they were made.

PSED: This week, we focused on the emotion of happiness. We discussed what makes us happy and what our body feels when we are happy.

PD: The children practised their balancing, jumping and hopping skills in PE this week. We have also been practising cutting and name writing.

EAD: The children have been making crafts to reflect their learning of phonics sounds.

RE: This week, we focused on looking after God's world.
