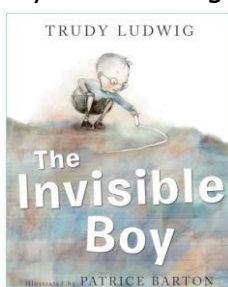

Housekeeping reminders for parents

Attendance and punctuality

Children's attendance and punctuality are vital to their academic and social development, and children with poor attendance do not progress as well as their peers.

Attendance and punctuality are also important life skills so please help us by ensuring your child attends school every day and by always arriving on time in the morning and when collecting your child at the end of the school day.

School starts each day at 8.55am but the doors to the playground open at 8.30am if you want to take your child to school early. School finishes each day at 3.30pm.

Holidays must not be taken in term time. Holidays taken during the school term will not be authorised and may be reported to the Education Welfare Officer. Our term dates are published on our website so please check them before booking holidays.

Absence

Please phone the school before 8.30am and leave a message on the designated absence line giving specific reasons for any illness (eg headache, temperature, upset tummy) rather than just saying that your child is unwell or sick. Please also remember to follow this up with a letter/email to the teacher and the office to ensure that the absence is authorised in the school's official register at info@oratory.rbkc.sch.uk

NB public Health England guidelines stipulate that children must stay away from school for 48 hours after their last episode of vomiting or diarrhoea.

Planned absence

Routine medical and dental appointments should be taken outside of school hours or in the holidays. However, we appreciate that this is not always possible and ask that you notify the school in advance and provide a copy of your child's appointment letter if they have an appointment during the school day.

Year 6: Visits to secondary schools are authorised but we ask that parents inform the school in advance so that this can be recorded in the register.

Please email the class teacher and the school at info@oratory.rbkc.sch.uk to inform us of any open day visits, exams etc

End of day collection

If someone else will be collecting your child and the arrangements are made in advance, please put a note explaining this in your child's school bag. This will authorise the teacher to let your child leave with the person named in your letter. Please reserve phoning the school or emailing the teacher/office on the day for emergencies only.

Permission to leave school unaccompanied

Please let the school know in writing or by email if you give permission for your child to leave school by themselves.

Emails can be sent to info@oratory.rbkc.sch.uk.

We will also ask you to complete a mobile phone permission form if your child will be travelling to or from school alone with a mobile phone, which will need to be handed into the office upon their arrival in school.

Medicines in school

The school is only permitted to administer medicines which have been prescribed by a doctor and there is a form for you to complete authorising us to do this. Please give your child any over the counter medicine (eg hay fever treatment) before the start of the school day. Children should never be given medicine to take to school; instead, please bring any prescribed medicine to the school office where you will need to complete a consent form.

Uniform

Our uniform is an important part of our school identity and one of the reasons you will have chosen Oratory for your child, and we expect all pupils to wear their uniform with pride. A uniform list is published on our website and we will carry out uniform checks periodically to ensure that all students wear the correct uniform. Please remember to label all items of uniform so that lost property can be returned to its rightful owner.

Jewellery, including earrings, may not be worn. Long hair past the collar must be tied back (including boys with longer hair), otherwise hair must be cut short at the back and sides.

Children's belongings

We want to encourage the children to be independent so please send your children to school with everything they will need during the day rather than having to drop things off at the school office during the day.

Allergies

Nuts of any kind are not allowed in school as we have several pupils with severe nut allergies.

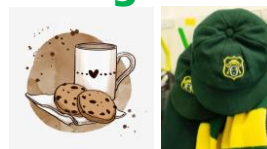

Parent Forum

We value open communication and consultation at Oratory Primary School and the school's **Parent Forum** makes it easier for parents to raise questions and make suggestions about the school. Our parent forum aims to represent the views of all parents and to be a voice to inform our school of the needs of children and families. Each half term, the parent reps from each class meet with Mrs Steinart to raise questions, suggestions and concerns. Mrs Steinart may also consult parents on future plans for the school. The forum facilitates communication between parents/carers and staff and governors, offer a parent's perspective on current policy and practice and input into decision making and planning for future provision. The next parent forum meeting will be held virtually on **21st October**.

How can I raise something for discussion at the forum?

- By emailing your class rep well before the meeting
- By sending a letter to the school, marked 'Parent Forum' and placed in the letterbox on the door in Bury Walk

How will I find out what was discussed?

The questions and suggestions raised at the meeting, along with the school's response and any actions taken will be sent to parents via Classlist, and uploaded on the school website.

What sort of things might be raised at the forum?

The forum will be a valuable way to share ideas, views, concerns and make suggestions for improvement. Possible topics might include school routines, school lunches, school events, fundraising, school uniform and general curriculum questions.

What sort of things should not be raised at the forum?

The forum is not a place to address specific concerns about an individual child or issues relating to individual members of staff. Parents who need to discuss these issues should approach their class teacher or the Deputy/Headteacher.

Harvest Collection for 'The Trussell trust'

The Trussell Trust support a nationwide network of food banks and provide emergency food and support to people locked in poverty, and campaign for change to end the need for food banks in the UK. In the UK, more than 14 million people are living in poverty – including 4.5 million children. They support more than 1,200 food bank centres in the UK to provide a minimum of three days' nutritionally-balanced emergency food to people who have been referred in crisis, as well as support to help people resolve the crises they face.

On Friday 2nd October we will be holding a special harvest assembly with Fr James, and we are asking each child to bring a donation to the Trussell Trust. We will then need some kind parent helpers to take the food along to the collection centre after the assembly – so please do let Mrs Steinart know if you are able to help. Our Oratory Allkind Education Wellbeing Practitioner

Our Allkind wellbeing practitioner, Annabelle, visited each class today to introduce herself to the children and talk about all the excellent support she provides for our school. Annabelle will also be at our coffee morning on Monday, so do please come and say hello to her!



Allkind

Your Wellbeing Support

Hi, I'm Annabelle, and I'm here to support children and their families through early prevention, early intervention and education as part of the Mental Health Support Team (MHST).

We believe early intervention is key to improve wellbeing and decrease the number of mental health difficulties in children.



Who Am I?

I'm an Educational Mental Health Practitioner (EMHP), working in your school to promote good emotional wellbeing and mental health of children and young people.

I work collaboratively with parents to develop coping strategies to manage your child's distressing thoughts and increase resilience to future problems.

What Do I Do?

- 1:1 work with parents providing guided self-help to support challenging behaviour or anxiety.
- Leading group workshops to raise awareness about mental health and equip students with tools to manage stress and anxiety.

I'm here to listen and support you.

How to Reach Me?

Speak to your child's teacher or Mr. Alton and they will be able to assist you. Once the referral is made I will contact you for more information and schedule the first session.

What's been going on in class this week?

Year 6

What a wonderful week it has been in our Year 6 class! The children have settled so well into their new roles at the top of the school, as learners, Prefects and as Owls to their Reception Owlets. In the classroom, the children have focused on the following:

Maths: Place Value: Determining the value of digits in numbers to 1,000,000; Determining the value of digits in numbers to 10,000,000; Reading and writing numbers up to 10,000,000; Using place value knowledge to understand numbers that are 10, 100 or 1,000 times the size of other numbers.

English: *Reading Focus:* The Sister Who Ate Her Brothers by Jen Campbell; Increase their familiarity with a wide range of books, including traditional stories, fiction from our literary heritage, and books from other cultures and traditions; Making comparisons within and across books; *Writing Focus:* To sequence and tell a traditional tale using oral storytelling techniques. *Grammar & Punctuation Focus:* Identifying & constructing main clauses; Using subordinate clauses to develop sentences; Using relative subordinate clauses to add extra information.

RE: Creation & Covenant: To show understanding of the literary form and symbolism in the second Creation story; Show understanding of literary forms, including metaphor, symbolic language and poetry.

Science: Electricity: we reviewed the key components of an electrical circuit, including cells, wires, bulbs, switches and buzzers, and created circuits in groups.

History: World War 1: To understand why we study history and explored the difference between primary and secondary sources.

Latin: Year 6 learnt how English is influenced by Latin, translating words such as: mater, pater and infans. They also learnt some Latin phrases that are still used in English (tempus fugit!)

Art: To create self-portraits.

PE: Tag Rugby

We are so looking forward to another brilliant week next week. The children have made an excellent start to the year and should be proud of their efforts so far!

Year 5

What a wonderful week we have had in Year 5! The class have been eager to settle into our classroom routines, doing so with kindness and respect (and smiles!).

English – We started reading our new class novel *Rumaysa* by Radiya Hafiza, which we have been thoroughly enjoying. We have noticed the novel's connection with fairy tales and have done some fantastic writing, warning people not to enter the eerie forest surrounding Rumaysa's tower.

Maths – We have started our Place Value unit, looking at numbers to 10,000 and revisiting our rounding skills.

RE – We studied the life and impact of Saint Thomas More, our class saint. We have reflected on how he was a person of integrity who stood by his faith, no matter what.

Art – We have created fantastic self-portraits and started looking at Ancient Egyptian art.

PE – In PE this week, we practiced our Rugby passes.

PSHE – We have reflected on our school motto, values, and began our Class Book by creating illustrated name tags!



Year 4:

Year 4 have had a busy week of learning across all their subjects. Here's a look at what we have been up to!

English: We have been working on summarising familiar traditional tales. We have been visualising characters based on a text and writing descriptive sentences.

Maths: We started to look at place value, focusing on representing and partitioning 4 digit numbers.

R.E: We discussed the events in the beginning of the book of Genesis and about God's covenant with Abraham.

Science: We started to explore living things and sorted living things using Venn diagrams.

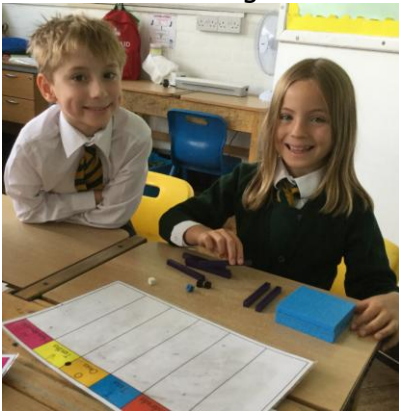
History: Ahead of our study of the Romans, we discussed chronology of timelines and identified different events on our timelines.

PSHE: We explored the differences between mental and physical health.

P.E: We practised our passing and tagging skills for tag rugby.

Art: We sketched different facial features and drew our own self portraits. We also create beautiful ripple watercolours for our school art project.

Well done Year 4 on a great week! Have a lovely weekend. Miss McVeigh and Ms. Mark.



Year 3:

Year 3 have hit the ground running this year! Ms Ffyon and I are very proud of how hard everyone has worked. This week we have learnt:

-In Maths, we have focused on place value. We consolidated our learning of tens and ones from Year 2 and can now count in hundreds.

-In English, we have begun our new class novel: The Pied Piper of Hamelin by Michael Morpurgo. We have used role play to develop ideas for a diary entry recording rats investing our homes. We have also been consolidating our expanded noun phrases to describe the rats behaviour and appearance.

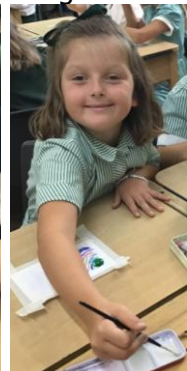
-In PSHE, we have been coming up with class rules and discussing the important of a harmonious classroom.

-In History, we compared the King's Road in the past and in the present by using photographs as a primary source.

-In French, we looked at our new topic of 'Greetings and Classroom Instructions' to familiarise themselves with some new vocabulary. The children learnt how to ask each other's names and say what they are called.

-In PE, Year 3 started learning the rules of tag rugby.

-In Art, we have been working on our self-portraits.



Year 2:

We have had a wonderful week in Year 2 and the children have been settling into their new classroom brilliantly! We have been focussing on settling back into school routines and getting to know each other. Here is what we have been up to:

- In **English**, we began reading our class text 'Rapunzel'. We have been thinking about Rapunzel's experience and her feelings, with a focus on using capital letters and full stops. We have also started planning a diary entry in role as Rapunzel.
- In **Maths**, we have been focusing on numbers to 20, counting in 10s to 100 and recognising 10s and 1s.
- In **Science**, we have been exploring and comparing the differences between things that are living, things that have lived and things that have never been alive.
- In **RE**, we have been learning about our class saint, St Martin de Porres. We have also been exploring our school prayer and thinking about ways that we can bring peace.
- In **PSHE**, we talked about the Zones of Regulation and thought about our different emotions.
- In **Art**, we have been drawing our self-portraits using careful observation. We have also made drawings of hedgehogs, creating different drafts by accepting constructive feedback from each other to improve our work.



Year 1:

We have had a brilliant first full week in Year 1. This is what we have learnt:

Maths: We have learnt about sorting items on size, shape and colour. We have been using our tens frames to represent numbers. We have also been counting and finding groups up to ten.

English: This week we have started our fairy tale topic and have been reading Prince Cinders. We enjoyed predicting what might happen next and retelling the story through mime. We also had fun sequencing the events in the story.

Phonics: This week we have been recapping our sounds from reception.

Religious Education: We have illustrated our school motto with beautiful drawings. We have started to learn some of the school prayer and thought about how God has made us all special in our own way.

Handwriting: We have been focusing on writing our names and identifying the letters that are in our names.

Art: This week we have been finishing our whole school ripple artwork. We have thought about the ripples of kindness we would like to spread and used oil pastels and watercolour to create wonderful artwork. We have also been learning to listen to feedback and improve our drawing skills.

PE: This week we played some fun games that helped us learn to move our bodies and equipment with greater control and coordination.

Reception:

Well done to all the children who have started in Reception this week! The children have been spending their mornings learning school rules and routines. They have also spent some time becoming familiar with the toys, resources and adapting to the classroom. We are looking forward to a busy year of playing and learning ahead.
